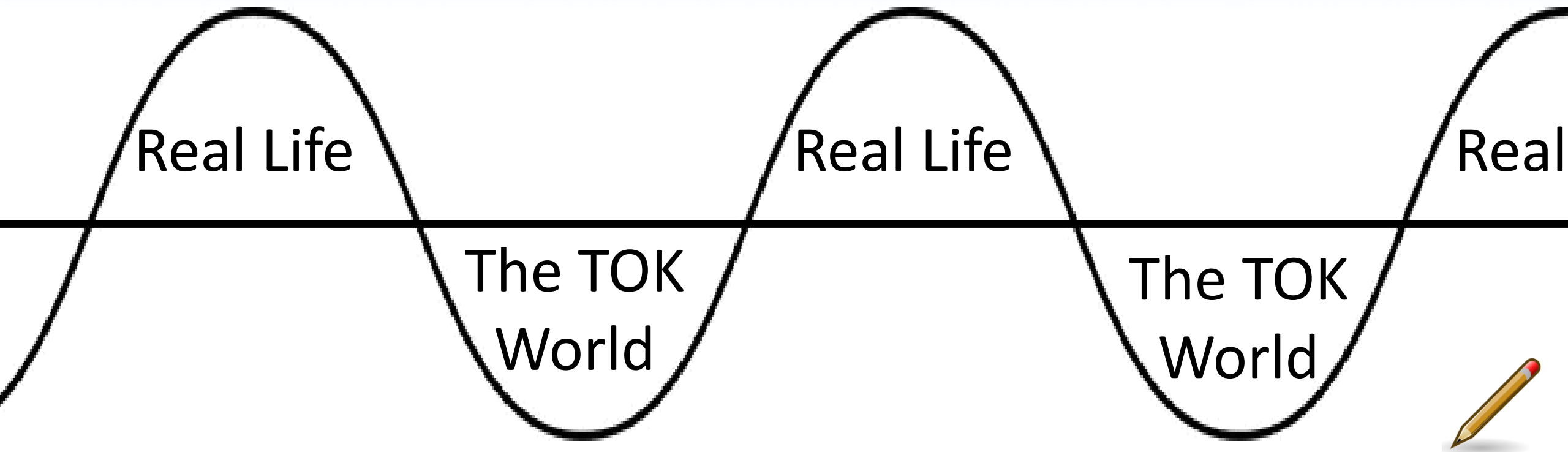




THE TOK BICYCLE

The best way to create good Knowledge claims, guide TOK debates, and write good essays is to think of the process like the diagram below. Copy this into your journal and I will explain more.

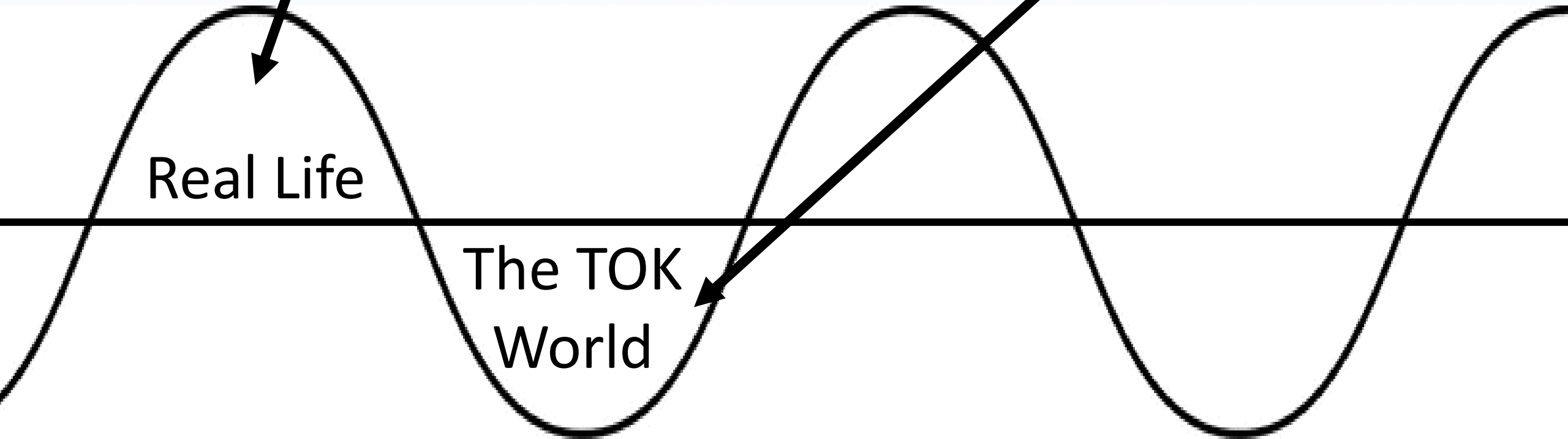


Real Life represents actual experiences – things you have read, heard, seen, or experienced

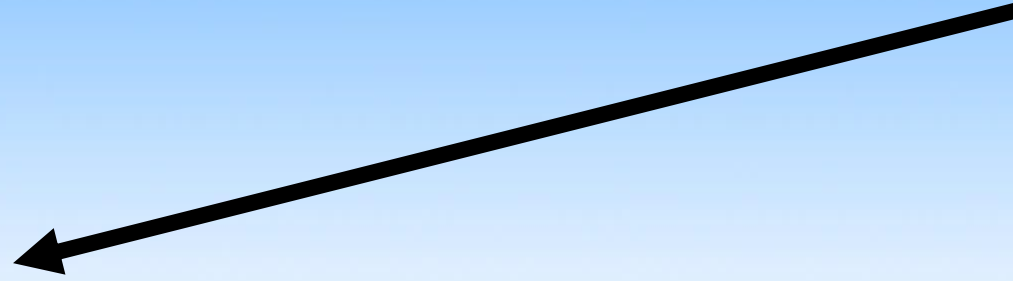
TOK represents AOK – Areas of Knowledge – Arts, Science, Math, Ethics, History, etc.
WOK – Ways of Knowing – Sense Perception, Emotion, Language, etc.

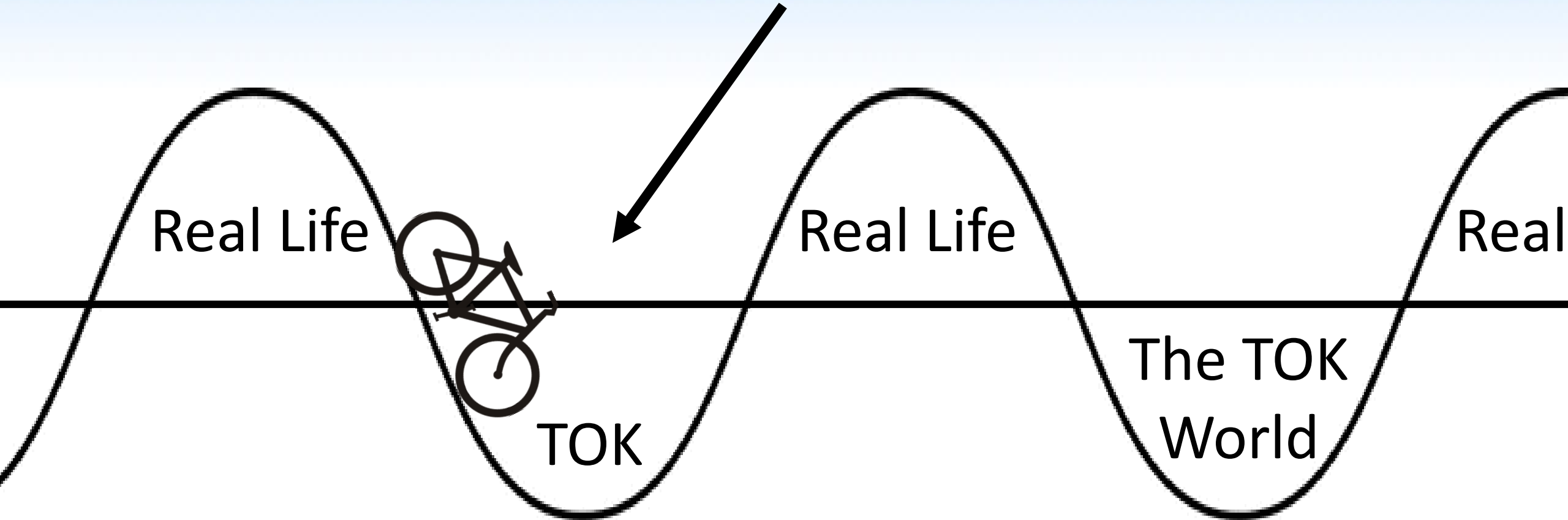

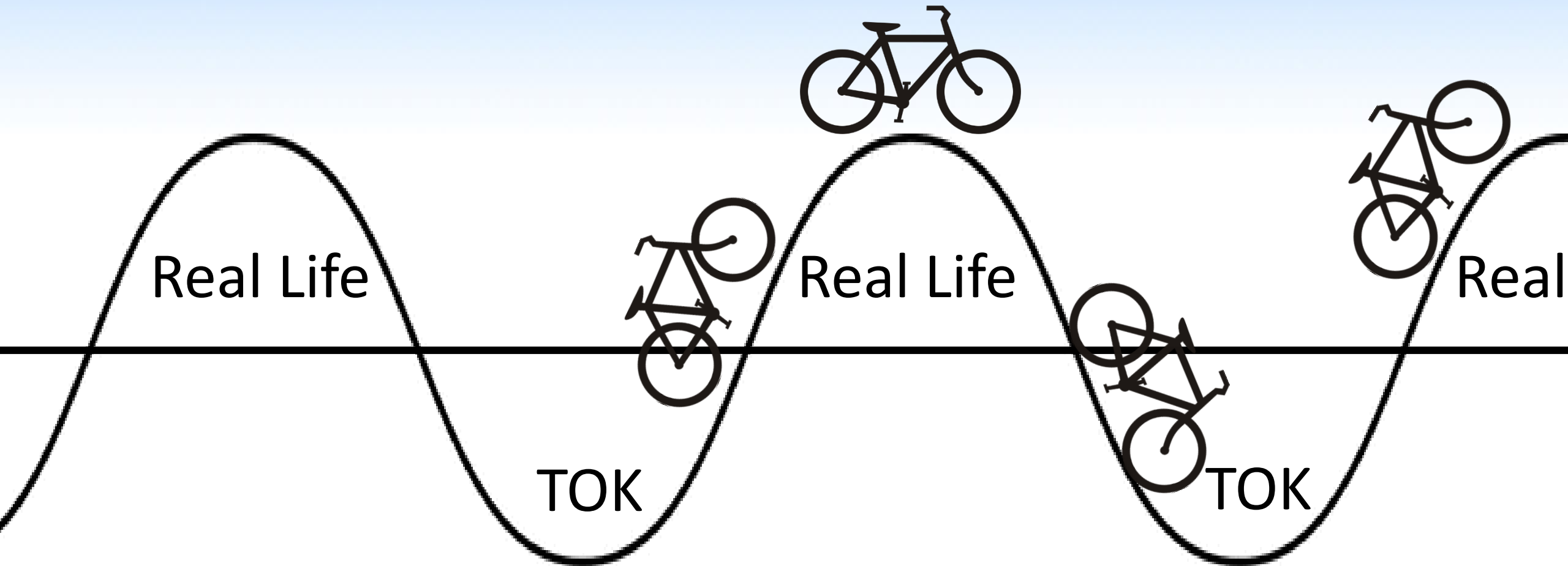

We then observe the experience through the lens of TOK. Now, we consider how it fits into certain Areas of Knowledge and what Ways of Knowing can be used to understand it better.

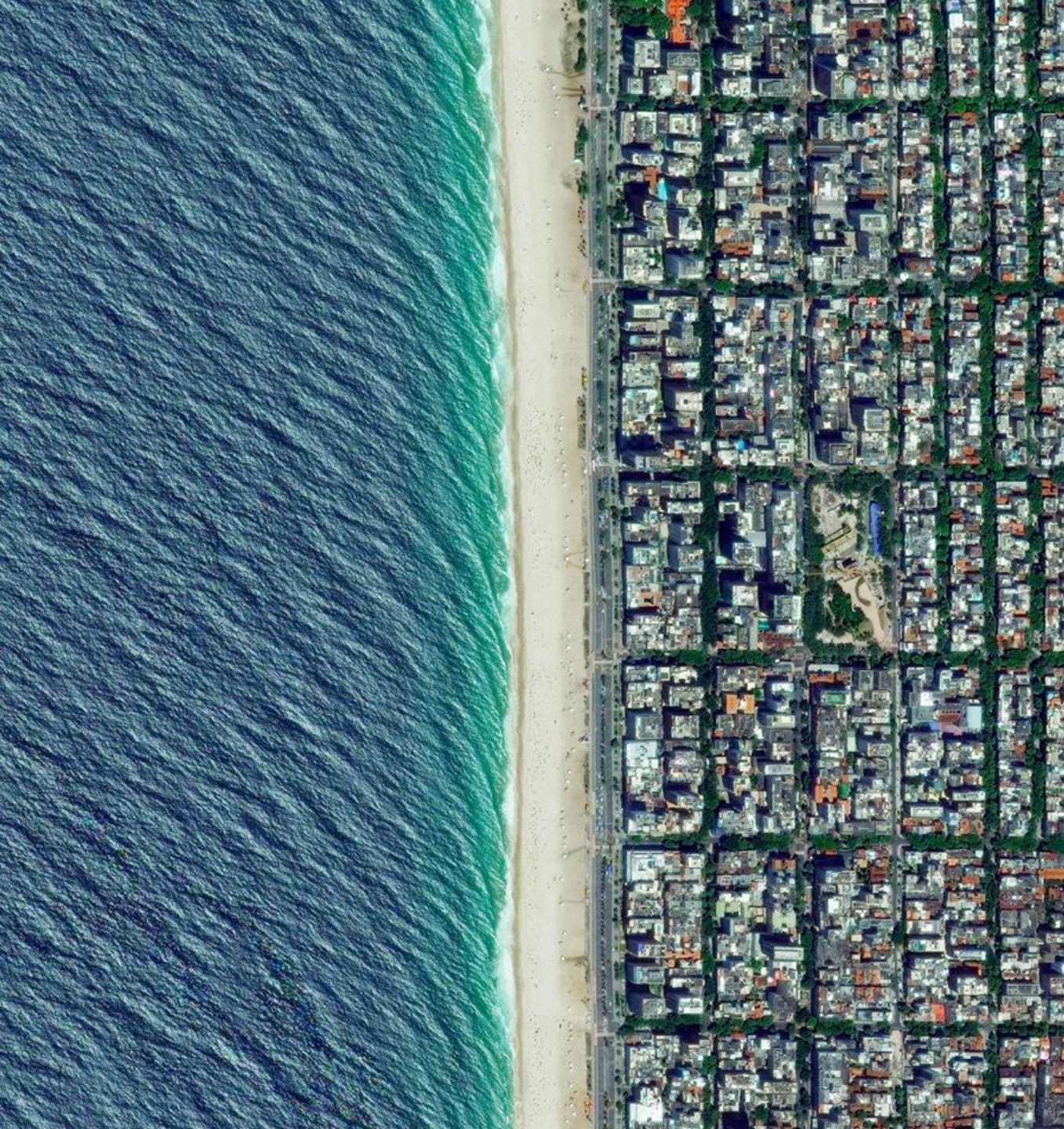

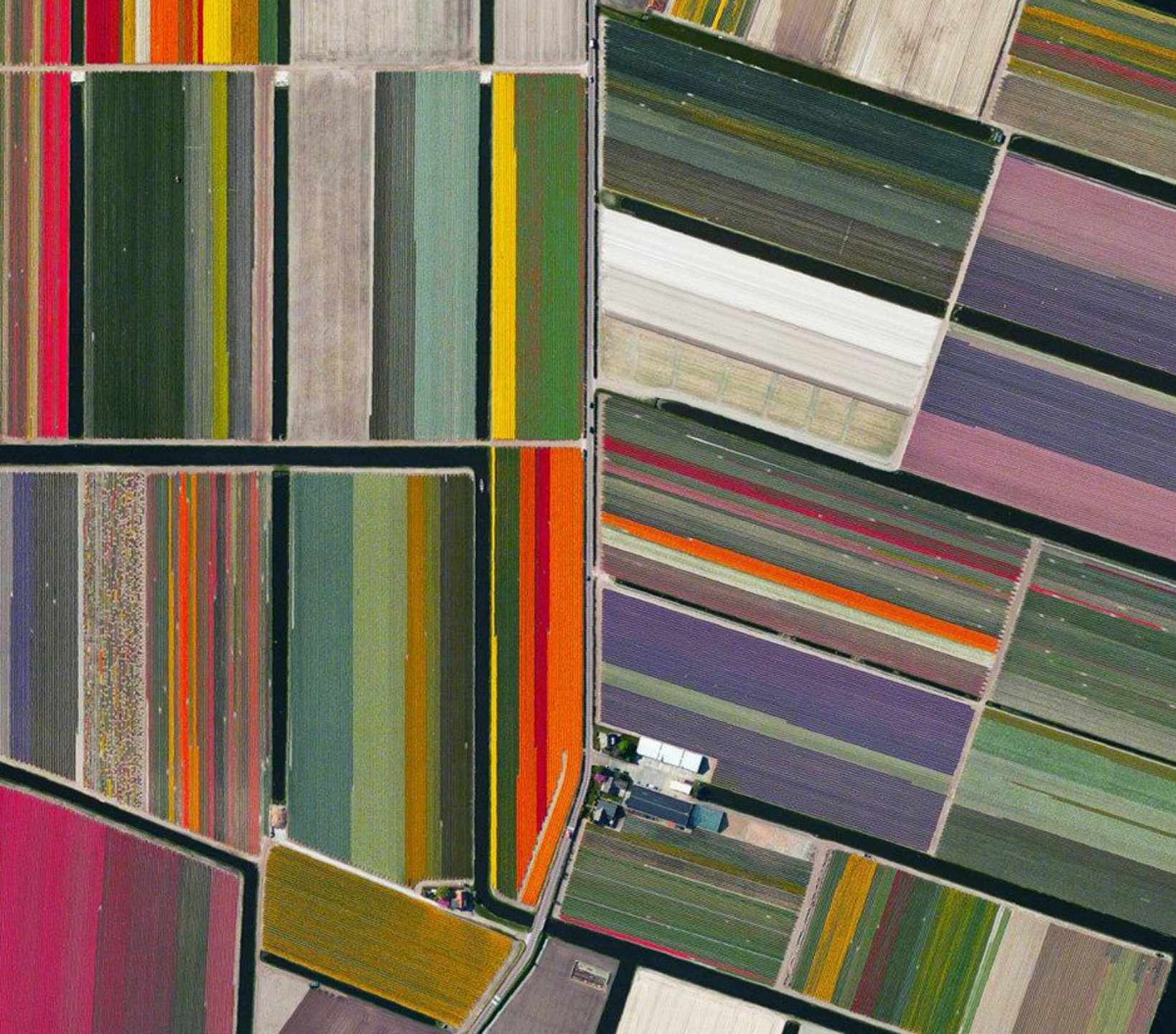

These images come from a book called Overview by Benjamin Grant. These satellite images offer a new perspective on the world we live in.

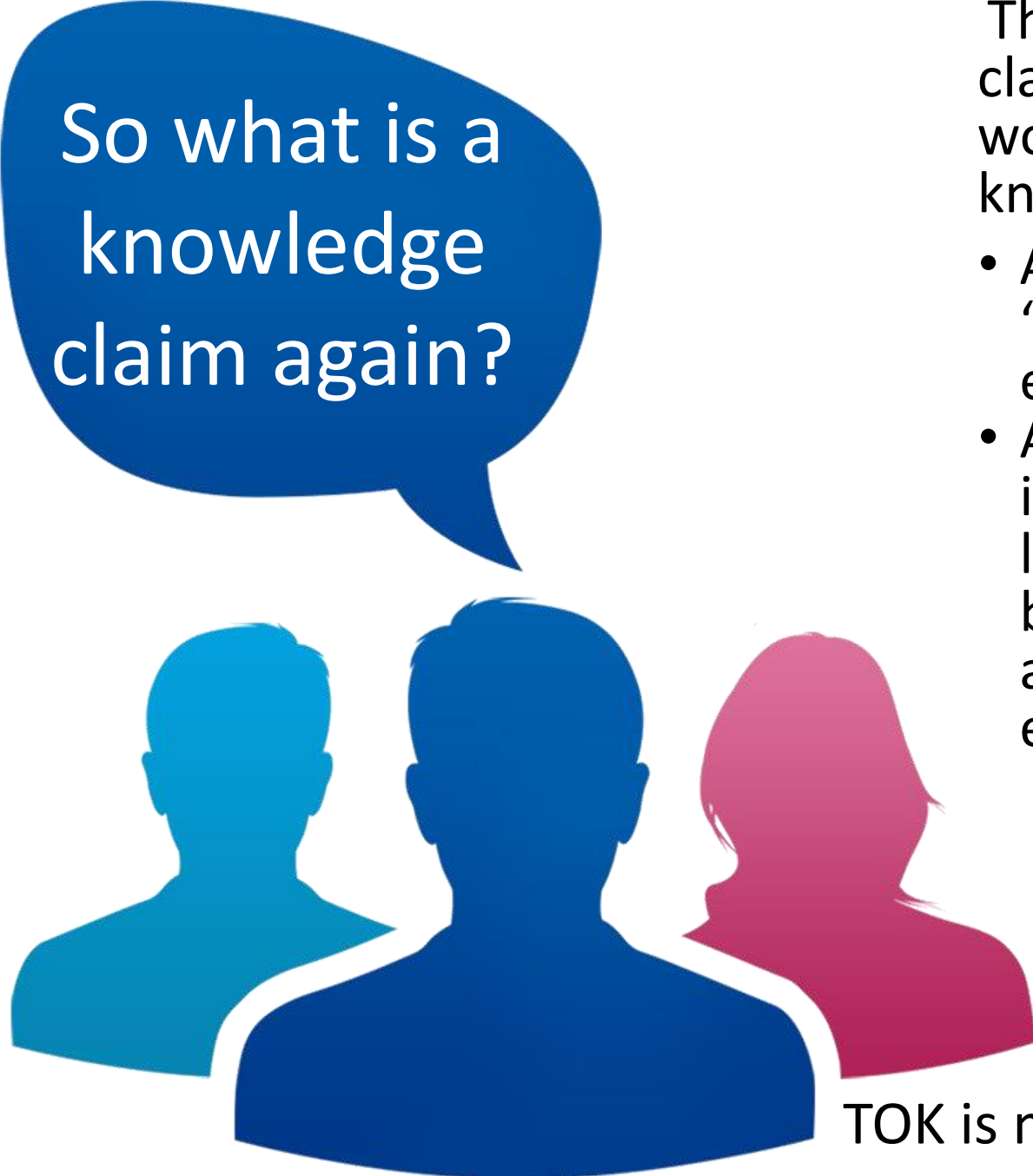
Seeing these images is now a RLS for us all. What things from the TOK diagram are CLEARLY connected to it?

So what is a
knowledge
claim again?

There are two different types of knowledge claims—the first type is claims about the world, and the second type is claims about knowledge.

- An example of a claim about the world is: “Hydrogen is the lightest chemical element.”
- An example of a claim about knowledge is: “The knowledge that hydrogen is the lightest chemical element is quite secure because the methods of chemistry give us a fairly good model of what chemical elements look like.”

This second claim is a claim about the reliability of the methods of chemistry itself, not about hydrogen. It is therefore a claim about knowledge, or a “second order knowledge claim”.

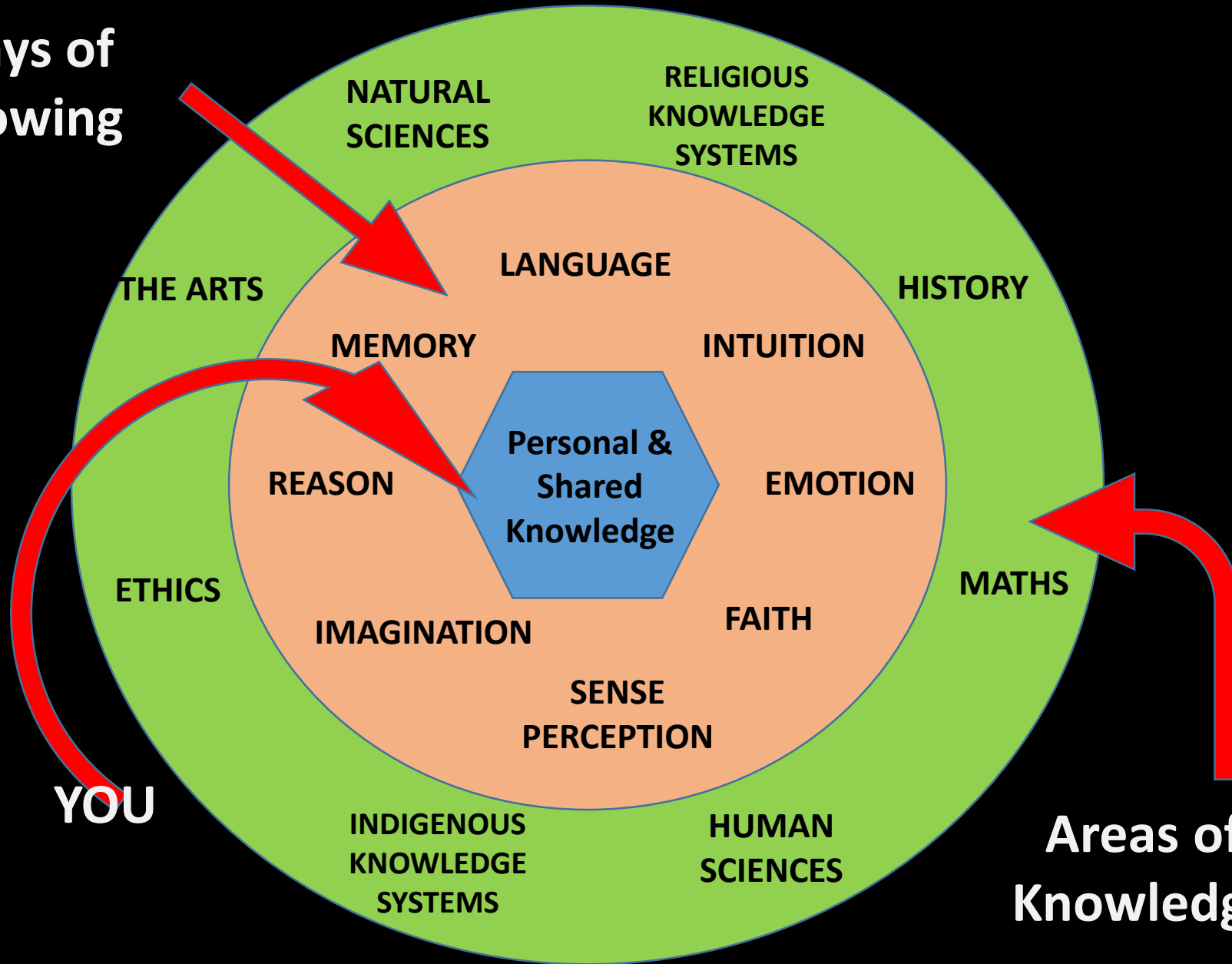
TOK is much more interested in this type of claim.

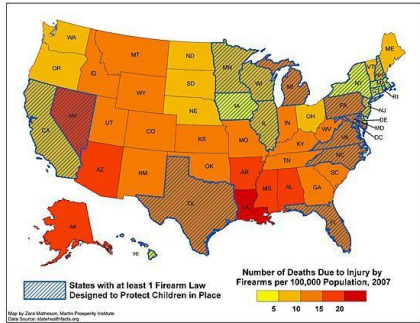

If we use the Gun statistics as a RLS, can you pull out a 1st order KC that it makes AND make your own 1st order KC about it?



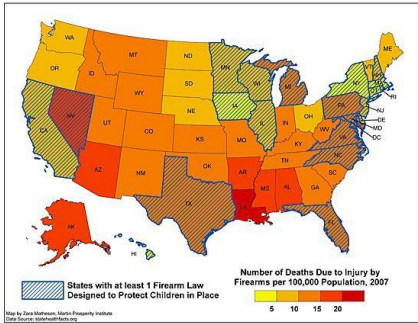

NOW... Make a 2nd order KC that connects to the 1st order claim with one or more of the diagram connections you just made.

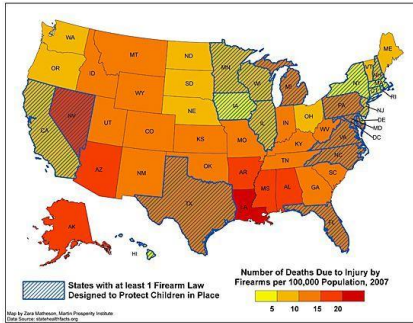
